CONSENT AND CLARITY.**



DEFINITIONS FIRST

<u>Term</u>	<u>Definition</u>
Trigger Warning (TW)	A warning that alerts readers to content that could evoke trauma responses due to past experiences
Content Warning (CW)	A broader notice about potentially sensitive or intense themes or events (not always traumatic)

WHAT IS A TRIGGER WARNING?



Purpose: To help survivors or individuals with trauma avoid re-experiencing distress

Key Traits:

- Trauma-linked
- Usually specific
- Meant to help readers protect their mental health



TRIGGER WARNING EXAMPLES

SEXUAL ASSAULT

SELF-HARM OR SUICIDE

CHILD ABUSE

PTSD FROM VIOLENCE

EATING DISORDERS

WHAT IS A CONTENT WARNING?

Purpose: To inform readers about mature, graphic, or intense content.

Key Traits:

- Not necessarily trauma-linked
- Covers emotional or moral discomfort
- Broad, flexible, often author-defined

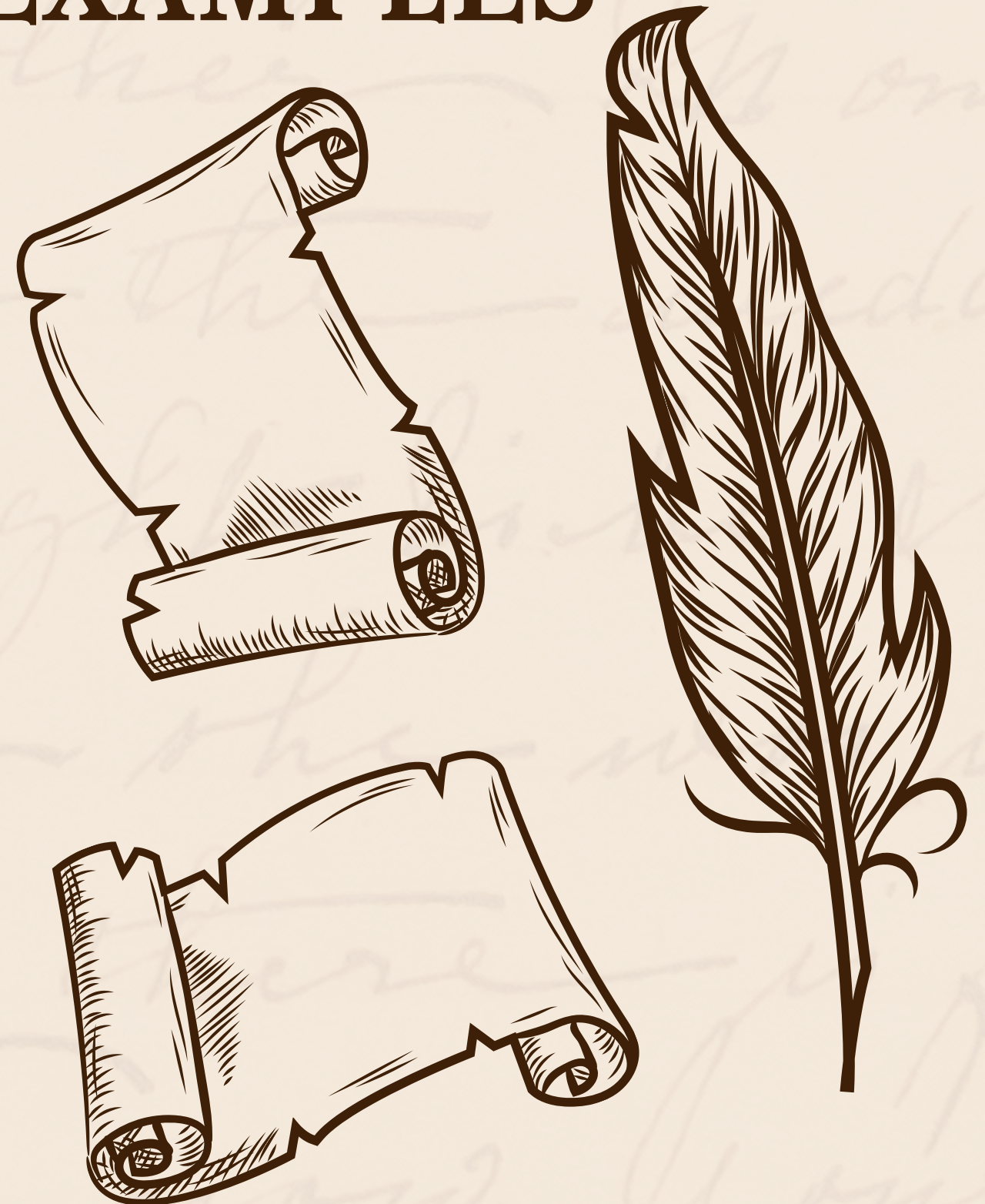

ASPECT

Purpose

Required?

Examples

Tone

TRIGGER WARNING (TW)

Avoid triggering trauma

Optional, but respectful

Rape, suicide, abuse

Clinical, protective

CONTENT WARNING (CW)

Flag mature/sensitive content

Optional, genre/context dependent

Violence, drug use, profanity

Informational, advisory

SHOULD INDIE AUTHORS USE THEM?

YES, ESPECIALLY IF:

- Your book contains graphic or potentially traumatic content
- You're writing dark romance, horror, psychological thrillers, etc.
- Your target audience includes vulnerable or marginalized communities

BUT:

- Avoid vague, overused phrases like “may be triggering”
- Overuse can dilute impact—be clear and precise

How to Include Them



PLACEMENT OPTIONS

- Before the book begins (dedication or author's note)
- On your website
- At the end of your blurb (or under a spoiler cut)
- Hidden but accessible ("Click here for CW/TW" link)

WORDING EXAMPLE

"This book contains depictions of sexual assault, suicidal ideation, and disordered eating. Please read with care."

GENRE-SPECIFIC NORMS

ROMANCE

- TW/CW common in dark romance, taboo, or BDSM
- Usually placed before the first chapter or on sales page

HORROR & THRILLER

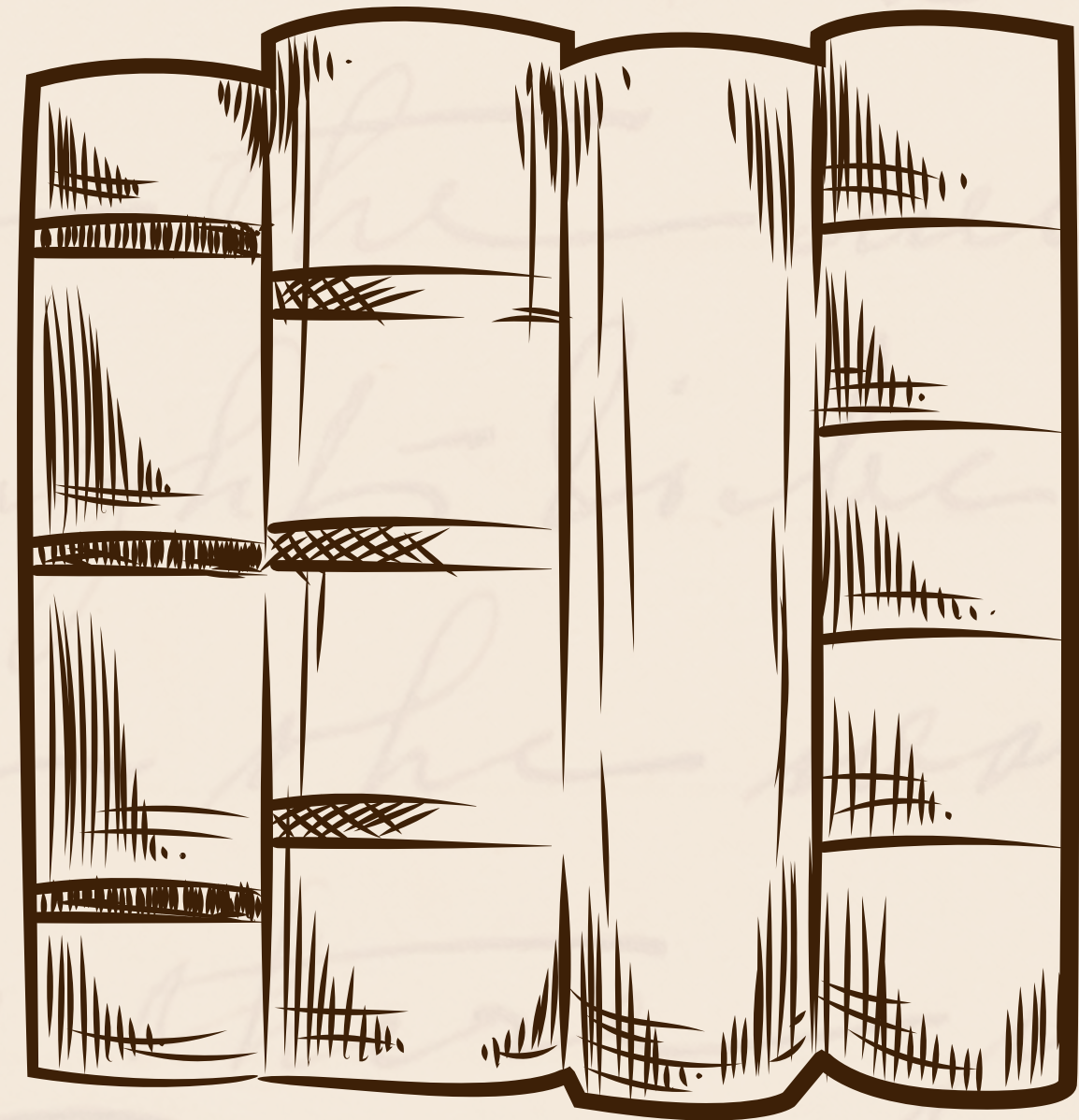
- More likely to use content warnings than trigger warnings
- Graphic scenes should be disclosed clearly if extreme

YA & NA

Growing demand for transparency in coming-of-age themes, trauma, mental health

READER EXPECTATIONS & BACKLASH

- Readers expect honesty and agency
- No warning ≠/brave storytelling—it may feel like a betrayal
- Some reviewers highlight missing warnings as a negative





**KEEP TONE RESPECTFUL AND
NONJUDGMENTAL**

USE PRECISE LANGUAGE, NOT EUPHEMISMS

BE CONSISTENT ACROSS YOUR SERIES

**PROVIDE AN OPT-IN SYSTEM (E.G., HIDDEN
LINK OR AUTHOR SITE)**



**WARNINGS ARE TOOLS, NOT
SPOILERS**

**THEY DEMONSTRATE EMPATHY,
NOT FRAGILITY**

**GIVE READERS AUTONOMY
WITHOUT UNDERMINING YOUR
ART**

**WHEN IN DOUBT: ERR ON THE
SIDE OF TRANSPARENCY**
